Employees serving the community through our food bank garden

Our staff are active members of their community, helping in unique ways. Look behind our offices and you'll see the fruits and vegetables of their volunteer labor. Staff grow and maintain a volunteer food bank garden. The garden typically produces 200 to 300 pounds of food per season and is grown entirely by staff working on their own time. All food is donated directly to the Clark County Food Bank warehouse in Vancouver.

In 2010, District staff transformed a rose garden into two small garden plots, which quickly expanded to four plots. Staff volunteer to rototill and amend the soil, plant, weed, mulch, harvest and deliver to the local food bank on their breaks, lunch hours, after hours and on weekends. All funds for materials are donated by employees.
