

DISTRICT OVERVIEW

- Water-sewer district (RCW 57)
 - Full-service collection utility, established in 1958
 - \$18.4M annual budget: Rate/connection charge supported
 - 81,000 people served
 - 500 miles of pipe, 50 pump stations
- First (and only) special purpose district to be accredited by APWA
- Excellent financial standing 30 years of clean audits

- Regional Sewer Basics
 - Emphasis on treatment
 - Major cost center
 - Specialized expertise
 - Serves multiple UGAs
 - Best managed under regional framework
 - Area served (inset map)
 - Key assets
 - Ridgefield, Salmon Creek treatment plants
 - Major pipelines/pump stations



REGIONAL PACKAGE – Element 1 Foundation: DCWA – What Is It

- Formed under new state legislation
 - Joint Municipal Utility Services Act (JMUSA) allows more efficient, flexible regional governance structure (RCW 39.106)
- Asset-based model members pay for direct benefit only
- Flexible structure can add members or other services over time

 - Clark County: Commissioner Tom Mielke
 - CRWWD: Commissioner Neil Kimsey, Secretary
 - Ridgefield: Mayor Ron Onslow, Vice-Chair

REGIONAL PACKAGE – Element 1 Foundation: DCWA – Why It Matters

- Stable customer rates over time
 - Increasing treatment standards
 - Critical system improvements happen sooner
 - Larger customer base = lower capital costs
 - No need for duplicate facilities
- Environmental assets transcend borders



REGIONAL PACKAGE – Element 1 Foundation: DCWA – Why It Matters

Structured to Address Customer Priorities

% of respondents indicating high or very high level of importance per value Ensure reliable, predictable service for all customers 89% Manage financial resources in a responsible, efficient, equitable manner 86% Operate utility to protect public and environmental health and safety 82% Optimize the use of existing facilities 80% 79% Maintain financial transparency 77% Use new technology to achieve system efficiency, environmental protection Provide fair, positive, secure work environment for future utility employees 71% 71% Ensure capacity to support regional land use, economic development Invest in capital improvements that create system-wide benefits 67% Make business management decisions collaboratively with all partners 64%

- Key Outcomes of Partnership
 - Ridgefield
 - Transfers collection system to Clark Regional
 - Rate and connection charge stability today
 - Creates new capacity for revenue-generating uses
 - Pathway to stable and lower rates over time
 - Clark Regional
 - Adds value for customers through future growth
 - Treatment capacity investments
 - Fixed costs shared over larger customer base
 - Creates economic investment opportunity
 - Reduces SDCs for local business

Both agencies benefit!






- Ridgefield customers pay reasonable surcharge on initial investment to connect to Regional system
- Clark Regional customers do not pay for merger; rates projected to increase at inflationary level with or without partnership
- Clark Regional rates could go down if Ridgefield generates new connections


